*IMPORTANT NOTE: The divine name Yahweh is usually translated "LORD" (all caps) in English versions of the Bible because it became a practice in late Old Testament Judaism not to pronounce the sacred name of YHWH but to say instead "my Lord / sovereign master" (Adonai) – a practice still used today. When the vowels of Adonai were attached to the consonants YHWH in the medieval period, the word *Jehovah* resulted. Today many Christians use the word Yahweh, the more original pronunciation, not hesitating to name the divine name since Jesus taught believers to speak in a familiar way to God. So every time we see all caps LORD in our Bibles think "I AM" think "He Who Is" – God absolutely IS. Every time we hear the name Yahweh (even the short form Yah which is found in Hallelu-jah, meaning *praise Yahweh*) lets remember what that name communicates = God's active presence!

1. God's concern and choice

(Exodus 2:23-3:9)



There's a particular way to approach him. This is one of the first places in Scripture we see the word *holy*. God breaks through the tension with great concern, a personal mission statement and an unexpected choice.

Exodus 3:7 "I have seen...heard...I am concerned...so I have come down to rescue them."

2. Moses' insecurities and God's answer (Exodus 3:10-15)
