III. What does this mean to us?

- A. Being in God's image means subduing the earth so that God's benevolence provides for His people.
- B. God's Sabbath was coming to dwell with His people which refreshed Him, so man's Sabbath is dwelling in God's presence with His people which is our refreshing.
- C. This tears down the separation between the secular and the sacred. There is, in effect, no such thing as secular.

LIVE THE STORY

Text: Genesis 1:14 - 2:3

I. The Seventh Day (2:1-3)

- A. The focus of creation week.
- B. When the Israelites heard "God rested," they would have associated it with His arrival to rule.
 - i. Psalm 132:13-14
 - ii. Revelation 21:1, 3, 22-26
- C. Creation is for God and man to commune together.
 - i. We were created for communion with God, and worship is a key element of our communion with God.
 - a) To commune with God in truth results in worship.
 - b) Where God is present with his people *is* a sanctuary.
 - ii. God's purpose in creating the world as the dwelling place of God with man is reflected in the building of both the tabernacle and the temple.
 - a) Exodus 25-30 Seven speeches
 - b) Exodus 35:30–36:1 God spoke, Spirit worked, It was so.

- D. God created the world to be His dwelling place with man and the throne of His Kingdom whose dominion will be exercised through His representatives in the world.

 - i. The great sea creatures

Allen Ross: The pagans worshiped the great sea creatures as dragons and monsters in rebellion that had to be subdued....
Canaan may fear and venerate them as gods, but Israel knew that they were just another part of God's perfect and harmonious creation.

- ii. God filled these once uncontrollable places with fish and birds.
- F. Day Six (Genesis 1:24-31): All Creatures on Land
 - i. God filled the earth with animals. (24-25)
 - ii. Man in the Image of God (26-31)
 - a) This is all about the divine purpose for human life.
 - > God He filled His sanctuary and dwelling place with His image by making man.
 - > Kings set up images of themselves throughout their lands to show the extent of their reign.
 - Man is given dominion because being in God's image he is a living representation of God's rule over creation. Where we are, God's reign is to be.
 - We are made to rule over creation for the same reason God ruled over it: to extend the benevolent rule of our God to His people.
 - b) Both male and female are created in God's image and are given the ability to multiply beings, as it were, *create* other beings in His image.

The world was created with a purpose: to be the dwelling of God with man, the place of His rule.

We were created with a purpose: to extend His benevolent reign to one another and to rule over the rest of creation in a way that keeps it ordered for the benefit of God's kingdom.
