C. Change your laughter to mourning and your joy to gloom.

Moo: Many people in our day, both outside the church and within it, are marked by a superficial joy and brittle laughter. They live the hedonist philosophy, 'eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we die', that ignores the terrifying reality of God's judgment. But even the committed Christian can slip into a casual attitude towards sin, perhaps presuming too much on God's forgiving and merciful nature. It is to all such people that James issues his plea for a radical, thoroughgoing repentance. Only such repentance can produce true Christian joy – the joy that overflows from the consciousness of sins forgiven.

Introduction: Reconciling Our Infidelity with God (4:6)

# . Submit Yourselves to God (4:7-8a)

#### A. Submit Yourselves to God

Cornelius Plantinga Jr.: "What is troubling is that the advocates of humility and submissiveness have often had a personal stake in the popularity of these virtues and have therefore made adopting them look like the project of a special-interest group."

- i. This means to put yourself under the control of God!

  G.K. Chesterton: "A man was meant to be doubtful about himself, but undoubting about the truth; this has been exactly reversed."
  - ii. Biblical humility begins by doubting ourselves, and staking everything on the truth of something as "wholly other than us" as possible—God.
  - B. Resist the devil.
    - i. Submitting to God and resisting the devil are two sides of the same coin. (Luke 4:1-13)

ii. We resist by Profession and Prayer. (Matthew 6:13)

McCartney: It is the devil who fosters jealousy and ambition,... and brews a broth of discord and contention and murderous envy to sap the church's vitality and undermine its integrity. The appropriate response to the demonic urge is to not give in to it.

- C. Come near to God and he will come near to you.
  - i. Coming near to God, drawing near to God, is an expression of submitting ourselves to God.

Humility is found as we submit ourselves by drawing near to God in prayer, in worship, and by meditating on His commands.

## ii. Isaiah 55:1-9

- a) "Seek ye the Lord, and when ye find him, call upon him; and when he shall draw nigh to you, 7 let the ungodly leave his ways, and the transgressor his counsels: and let him return to the Lord, and he shall find mercy; for he shall abundantly pardon your sins." (Isaiah 55:6-7 LXE)
- b) We will find mercy when God draws near to us... we will find pardon for our sins.

# II. Reforming Your Hearts (4:8b-10)

- A. Why clean our hands and purify our hearts?
  - i. Sin Pollutes
    - Psalm 24:3-4

- ii. The Day of Atonement.
  - a) Leviticus 16:29-34
  - b) There is no purifying our hearts apart from priestly ministry—the priestly ministry of Jesus.
- iii. Hands and hearts speaks of the whole of us.
  - 2 Corinthians 7:1
- B. Grieve, mourn, and wail.
  - i. Grieve: *to express sorrow or remorse for sin;* to lower ourselves.
  - ii. Mourn: a change from delighting in sin to grieving over it.
    - a) Isaiah 61:2-3
    - b) 1 Corinthians 5:1-2
  - iii. Wail
    - a) Revelation 18:9
      - > That weeping is at the great sense of loss they feel as they see their hopes wiped away.
    - b) Believers are called to weep over their sin... weep over the great sense of loss they have over how their idolatry has grieved their Husband, the Lord.
  - iv. James is calling us to return to God.
    - a) Joel 2:12-13
    - b) James is calling for the heart to be reformed in how it views sin.
