The following questions are designed for use in our Community Groups as an aid to growth in the Gospel and Community.

- Read Genesis 23. What stands out? What seems missing? What questions does it raise for you?
- In what ways does death threaten Abraham's promise of blessing? How might it threaten God's promise of blessing for you or anyone? How does this relate to grieving?
- ➤ Does grief in death mean that faith is absence? Do you think it is meaningful that God is not mentioned in this section? If so, how so?
- In what way does God begin to fulfill His promise to Abraham through the death of Sarah? How might this foreshadow the Gospel?
- Abraham calls himself an alien and stranger in their land. How does this model for followers of Jesus how we too are to live?
- What about Genesis 22:20-24 should surprise us in light of the story of Abraham? What temptations to his faith do you think Abraham may have faced when Sarah died?
- Why should we read or study theological-narratives such as Genesis differently than instructional letters such as James? Can you give some examples of different ways to read or study each?
- How does Abraham's facing of the death of his beloved Sarah while clinging to hope give us truth for understanding our world? What aspects of our world does it help us deal with?
