- Discuss the Haeurwas and Willimon quote (pg 2). In what way does allowing scripture, an ancient text, determine our message, make a moral declaration?
- What are some of the ways the peace of Christ is unique when compared to peace in a general sense? What does Colossians 1:21-22 say about the starting point for peace?
- Are you living in biblical peace, or just hanging out with "Wilson"?
- When we mature in Christ (i.e. Christ is formed in us), how does that change how we live, what we do with our lives, or what motivates us?
- How did this message speak to you? Were you prompted by the Spirit to take action in any particular way?
- What is God calling you to do in order to be that last mile of cable, that last 20 yards, connecting it into the lives of others?
