- a) Too often we want to convince the world that the church is a lot like them, so it's not so bad.
- b) The world needs for the church to be the church. Then they may think we are weird, but they will also know that we are a taste of heaven on earth!

Text: Acts 1:1-9; 2:1-13, 41-47; 4:32-34a

Introduction: It takes a miracle to birth a church!

"I could not have thought the church up. I could not have imagined church." 1

I. A New Nation that Functions a New Way (Acts 1:1-9)

- A. The Kingdom of God... the Nation of God.
 - i. Church and state; religion and politics
 - ii. Nations define us as people.
 - iii. Nations unite and divide.
- B. The disciples are interested in "when" the nation of God will come, but Jesus tells them they need to focus on **how**.
 - i. Waiting for the gift of the promised Spirit is essentially the same as waiting for the restoration of the Kingdom of God.
 - ii. Jesus doesn't dismiss their question but adjusts their thinking about the Kingdom.
 - a) The rest of Acts answers their question (and ours).

> But then something: the elimination of boundaries!
C. Jesus is starting a new nation that functions in a new way, and one of the key new ways is that all its boundaries are blown out and the world is his nation.
II. The Reversal of Babel and its Consequent Divisions (Acts 2:1-13)
 A. Babel was the beginning of nations. i. It was humankind's best attempt at a unified kingdom. a) It was possible, but not good.
b) Differences divide us.
ii. Pentecost reverses Babel.
B. The rushing mighty wind is reminiscent of that wind of God that was hovering over the chaos in the original creation.i. The sun will be darkened; the moon will not give its light.
ii. It is the end of the old and the start of the new. (2 Cor. 5:17)

b) If any word restoring the Kingdom to Israel where

- C. Christ unites people from every different place (whether geographically or economically).
 - i. The miracle that we call the church, is a miracle because it is the transformation of relationships.
 - ii. The church is the means for the miracle of uniting people from every nation, tribe, language, and people (Rev. 7:9) into one nation, one people, one community.

III. God's means to accomplish the impossible (Acts 2:41-47; 4:32-34a)

- A. What is meant in saying the miracle of the church is God's means to accomplish the impossible?
 - i. "The poor you will always have with you." (Matt. 26:11; Mark 14:7; John 12:8)
 - ii. But in the miraculous church birthed at Pentecost there are no needy persons among them!
 - a) Deuteronomy 15:4-5
 - b) Deut. 15:7-11
 - iii. God accomplished the impossible—a taste of heaven on earth. There were no needy persons among them!
- B. This is a picture of the church—and what God intends for it to be. It is not what we could have thought up. But it is what God imagined... and created!
 - i. It takes a miracle...
 - ii. It takes a miracle...

This miraculous new nation that brings an end to human divisions and stratification is what both churches represented here today must seek and find. It is what the world needs.
