LIVE THE STORY

The Gospel is intended to be learned and lived in community. The following questions are designed for use in our Community Groups as an aid to growth in the Gospel and Community.

- The author says "I want to tell you more, but you have become 'dull of hearing' (5:11) ESV. He uses the same word translated "lazy" in 6:12. Why was it to their own peril living only on milk and remaining as infants? (5:13-14). Why should we be alarmed by this?
- "Impossible" v.4 is a strong word attached to a chilling warning in vs.4-6. Why is it impossible to be "brought back to repentance"
- The author was convinced of better things among the Hebrews. (v.9) One of these better things was love shown to His people. Recently have you discovered fresh ways, that either you or your community group was able to minister to those that are weak or those who had need? What did it cost you beyond finances, if finances were a component?
- Another better thing was showing diligence. What does diligence "to the very end" look like (v.11)? How do you not become lazy (v12) but pursue diligence to inherit what was promised? What is required? How do you pursue diligence with one another?
- To make His promise clear, God swore by Himself. Why? What was He trying to make clear? (v.17)
