- ii. Jesus didn't give up on meaningfulness of life even in the midst of dying. Nothing was meaningless to Jesus—not even His suffering.
- iii. The NT makes clear that even your suffering is not meaningless! It may seem rather absurd, but its absurdity is transformed by your being joined to the sufferings of Christ.

When Life Gets Twisted: Finding Meaning in the Absurdity of Life Jerry Cisar — April 19, 2020

Text: Ecclesiastes 1:1-11

Introduction

Don't be fully invested in this life; its absurdity is evident. Enjoy the gift of life and be fully prepared for the day of judgment.

Life under the sun leads one to experience its absurdity; life beyond the sun leads one to meaningful living.

I. Meaningless and Absurd (1:2)

This phrase, here translated, "Meaningless, meaningless everything is meaningless," is repeated in 12:8.

- A. "Meaningless, meaningless everything is meaningless."
 - i. Cain and Hebel
 - a) fleeting
 - b) meaningless
 - c) absurdity

Michael V. Fox: "Hebel is a quality worse than nothingness, worse, even that pointlessness, for the existence of the man who loses his wealth is no more pointless than the stillbirth's. But his existence is more absurd, for he has seen and born life's irrationality" (42).

ii. Absurdity that leads to frustration. a) Romans 8:20-21	"Poverty, indeed considered in itself, is misery; so are exile, contempt, imprisonment, ignominy: in the end, death itself is the last of all calamities. But when the favour of God breathes upon us, there is none of these things which may not turn out to our happiness" (3.8.7).
b) The author of Ecclesiastes leads us to confront the absurdities of life that might frustrate our pursuit of meaningful existence.
